This Week's Readings: Jesus inaugurates the messianic age in a public act of boldness. Temple worship is to be purified and replaced by the person of the risen Christ.

First Reading *Exodus 20:1-17* The laws of God are summarised in the Ten Commandments. They begin with the reminder that God is the one who liberates.

Second Reading 1 Corinthians 1:22-25 The Christian message is a paradox - for the humiliation of Christ on the cross displays the glory of God.

Gospel John 2:13-25 Jesus rids the Temple of traders, but declares that he himself has replaced the building as the place wherein God dwells. He announces by his actions that the messianic age has begun.

Message from Deacon Michael: This week's Lenten talk was on the topic of Eucharistic Adoration, something in which we have all participated in one form or another over the years. So when did reservation of the Blessed Sacrament, and consequently adoration, all start? Belief in the real physical presence of Christ in the Eucharist was emphasised in the teaching of the evangelists and St Paul. In the early Church we know that hermits reserved the Eucharist in their cells and carried it from place to place. As monasticism changed from solitary to community life the Blessed Sacrament became an integral part of the church structure of a monastery. Initially it was reserved in a room separate from the sanctuary but by the year 800 it was common practice for the Blessed Sacrament to be reserved in the church itself, as it is today. Devotion to Our Lord reserved in the tabernacle developed initially in religious communities of both men and women, before becoming common practice amongst the laity. Pope Urban IV instituted the feast of Corpus Christi in the thirteenth century, and the devotion which we know as Benediction was strongly influenced by the establishment of this feast. Pope Clement VIII in 1592 introduced Quarant Ore, the forty hours devotion. In the sixteenth century, as a consequence of the Reformation in Europe, the Council of Trent robustly reaffirmed every aspect of Catholic belief in the Real Presence and of adoration. In later centuries perpetual adoration became common practice in monasteries and convents and many saints found strength through Eucharistic adoration. In the latter part of the twentieth century, some in the Church placed more emphasis on the celebration of the Eucharist (the Mass) and less on adoration, however, in more recent times successive Popes have strongly urged a return to Eucharistic adoration. There are ample opportunities for Eucharistic adoration in both our churches, especially during Lent. What a privilege to come into the presence of our beloved Lord.
