This Sunday's Readings: 5th Sunday of Easter. As we journey through life, the Lord is always there, taking the first step, coming to help us with the great commandment to love one another as he has loved us.

First Reading *Acts 14:21-27* Paul and Barnabas put fresh heart into the disciples and give an account of all God has done with them.

Second Reading *Apocalypse 21:1-5* The Lord makes his home among his people and wipes away all their tears.

Gospel John 13:31-35 Jesus gives his disciples the new commandment to love one another.

Message from Fr. Peter: A couple of weeks ago, St. John's Gospel told us about the third resurrection appearance to the Apostles – where he asked Peter three times 'Do you love me?' This was preceded by the Apostles having spent the night fishing and caught nothing, until Jesus appeared and encouraged them to try again, at which they caught a full net of fish – 153 of them. 153 is a very definite number to mention, and it sent me on a chase to figure out why that exact number should be mentioned. Well over the past couple of thousand years scholars have been chasing an explanation, too, and whilst there is no consensus on the why there should be this number, there are a number of suggested explanations. Some explanations focus on Hebrew words having numerical equivalents, which mean that 153 could be read as 'I AM GOD' or something or other, but other scholars completely debunk this. Numerologically wise, number 153 is equal to adding the first seventeen digits or 1 + 2 + 3 + 4 + 5 + 6 + 7 + 8 + 9 + 10 + 11 + 12 + 13 + 14 + 15 + 16+ 17. 153 is also the product of 9 x 17. If we add the individual digits (1 + 5 + 3) we end up with 9. If we add the cube of each of the individual digits $(1 \times 1 \times 1) + (5 \times 5 \times 5) + (3 \times 3 \times 3)$, the result is 1 plus 125 plus 27 or 153. (I don't understand any of that, so please don't ask me). Apparently if you add up the number of personal blessings that Jesus gives in the four Gospels it comes to 153 (I haven't verified this). St Louise de Montfort connects the catch of 153 fish with the number of Hail Marys said (3 plus 15 sets of 10) in the whole Rosary. There are heaps of other suggestions, but my favourite explanation comes from the Patron Saint of Bible Scholars, St. Jerome. He suggested that it was believed that there were 153 species of fish, and so the number symbolised all the different peoples of the world being welcomed into the one fishing net of the Holy Church, the peoples of which the Apostles were to be the 'fishers of men'. Let's ensure that our churches and our parishes are truly welcoming to all peoples, so that, like the net of the Apostles in the Gospels, our Churches might overflow with God's wonderful catch of people.

In 1925, under Pope Pius XI, this medal began to be awarded to civil, military, laity and clergy, in recognition of exceptional service to the Catholic Church.
